SDSU Imperial Valley Regional Resilience (R2) Center

The R² Center at SDSU Imperial Valley serves as a research hub and regional policy center in Imperial County, designed to develop partnerships between community agencies and SDSU. The R² Center contributes to expanded research opportunities for SDSU-IV students and affiliated

faculty members. The mission is to conduct transdisciplinary research that elevates the scholarship conducted on campus and improves the quality of life for Imperial Valley residents. Current members include faculty in the Criminal Justice, Homeland Security,



Mathematics, Public Administration, and Public Health fields. Examples of projects underway are the following: *National Science Foundation* (NSF) funded STEM education workshops; *Bureau of Justice Administration* funded crime prevention research projects with the City of Brawley Police Department; a *Collaborative Environmental Health Research Plan* for Imperial Valley; reducing vaping and secondhand exposure in Imperial Valley High Schools; and finally, studying rural heat islands and farmworker exposure to heat stress.

Faculty Spotlight: Dr. David Kanaan

Dr. David Kanaan is Chair of the Division of Professional Studies at SDSU Imperial Valley and an Associate

Professor of Public Administration with the School of Public Affairs at San Diego State University. His research focuses on government performance and the effectiveness of public policy. Dr. Kanaan served as Managing Editor of the internationally renowned journal *Public Administration Review* (PAR) from 2017 to 2021 and has presented his research at numerous conferences, including the *American Society for Public Administration* (ASPA), the *Urban Affairs Association* (UAA), and the *Association for Public Policy Analysis and Management* (APPAM). Before entering academia, he worked as a marketing executive, entertainment agent, and business owner. Dr. Kanaan is a graduate of the *University of Central Florida* (UCF) Doctoral Program in Public Affairs (Ph.D.) and has published articles in the peer-reviewed journals *Public Administration Review, Public Performance & Management Review, Public Integrity, Public Administration Quarterly, Journal of Public & Nonprofit Affairs, <i>Journal of Urban Affairs, Education and Urban Society*, and others.

SDSU Imperial Valley Public Administration Students in Sacramento and Washington, DC

Every year, SDSU Imperial Valley students travel with faculty and fellow San Diego students to either Sacramento, California, or Washington, DC. These trips are organized by the SDSU School of Public Affairs and the SDSU Imperial Valley Division of Professional Studies to build networks for students with state and federal leaders, including elected officials.

Students meet with U.S. congress members or state legislators, as well as prominent SDSU alumni and government officials. During the trip, students may have the opportunity to attend a public administration conference and establish relationships with colleagues from around the world. In addition, students and faculty visit historic buildings and museums while exploring either Washington, DC, the epicenter of national policy, or Sacramento, the policy center for the State of California, the fifth-largest economy in the world.

Faculty Spotlight: Dr. Sungjin Lee

Dr. Sungjin Lee is an Assistant Professor of Public Administration at San Diego State University for both the School of Public Affairs and SDSU Imperial Valley. His research focuses on policy analysis and evaluation to support more informed policymaking, particularly in the areas of criminal justice, welfare programs, and workforce development. His work explores the impact of welfare policies on economic

self-sufficiency and poverty reduction. Dr. Lee's research also examines the effectiveness of workforce development programs in enhancing local economic outcomes and expanding employment opportunities for marginalized populations in the face of emerging technologies. Before joining SDSU Imperial Valley, Dr. Lee was a Postdoctoral Researcher at The Ohio State University, where he conducted data analysis for several state- and federally funded projects, including projects related to the 5G and broadband workforce, Al and electric vehicle industries in Ohio, and the Ohio Reemployment Services and Eligibility Assessment (RESEA) program. He earned his Ph.D. in Public Affairs from the University of Missouri in 2023. Prior to his doctoral studies, he worked for the Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA), where he analyzed the effectiveness of South Korea's grant aid programs for developing countries.
